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## LATEST NEWS

### ***GSBC - BBS***

Starting with the summer term 2009 the GSBC will offer a new Brown Bag Seminar series (GSBC-BBS). The BBS will take place during class time on Wednesdays at 12 p.m. in seminar room 207 on the GSBC floor (2<sup>nd</sup> floor) or in seminar room 102 (1<sup>st</sup> floor), both at Bachstraße 18k – east wing. The BBS is a seminar series with flexible design: internal or external lectures, group discussions, etc.

### ***New Graduate College and new PIs***

On January 15<sup>th</sup>, 2009, the Annual General Meeting of the GSBC accepted the Graduate College „Foundations of Global Financial Markets - Stability and Change“ (GFinM) as a new member institution. It will be introduced in the next section of this newsletter.

### ***Coordinator of GFinM – Annelie Gallon***

My name is Annelie Gallon and I am the coordinator of the Ph.D. programme Foundations of Global Financial Markets – Stability and Change since October 2008. Before, I studied law at the Friedrich-Schiller University, Jena and the University of Indiana, Bloomington and received my degree (Erste juristische Prüfung) in July 2008.

My main interests lie in international law and the Anglo-American legal system. Moreover I like very much the work with students. Therefore I am the coach of this year's Philip C. Jessup International Law Moot Court Team. The Jessup Moot Court is a simulated trial before the International Court of Justice where students compete in argumentation skills and legal knowledge.

My strong interest in the US legal system led me to the topic of my Ph.D. thesis attempt to focusing on the extraterritorial effects of US financial sanctions. Here I prove that, especially with the introduction of the USA PATRIOT ACT, US law which effects other states territory violates international law.

### ***New Coordinator IMPRS – Tobias Uske***

Since November 2009, I have been working as the scientific coordinator of the IMPRS Uncertainty, succeeding Eva-Maria Steiger. I finished my PhD thesis at the Strategic Interaction Group of Prof. Güth in July, 2008.

Having used experimental economics, I investigated strategic uncertainty in Principal-Agent settings and bargaining situations. Currently my main interest is on tournament fever and the perception of competitors as a driving force to engage in competitions.

### ***New GSBC-Fellows***



*Jenny Block*

Jenny Block has studied Sociology with specialisation on Social Gerontology at the Free University of Berlin. In spring 2008 she graduated with a diploma thesis about political images of age(ing). After having worked as a scientific assistant within the German Ageing Survey at the German Center of Gerontology (DZA) in Berlin for three months, Jenny Block is now starting her dissertation project as a member of the Graduate School of Human Behaviour in Social and Economic Change at the Friedrich-Schiller-University in Jena. Her dissertation is going to deal with the trisected life course model and the question, how retired people evaluate their passed life time and the socially undefined time ahead as a retiree in consideration of the organisation of the three life spheres, gainful employment, spare time and familial duties.

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*Boris Heizmann*

Since January 2009, I am a PhD student at the Graduate School Human Behaviour in Social and Economic Change (GSBC). I received my diploma in sociology in 2007 at the Freie Universität Berlin. My diploma thesis dealt with the topic of value change. After my studies, I was employed as a research assistant at the Robert Koch-Institute in Berlin, Department of Epidemiology and Health Reporting.

In my dissertation project I will examine the relationship between ethnic/cultural heterogeneity and social capital from a cross-national perspective. Using a quantitative multi-level approach, I want to identify several societal and individual level influences of different aspects of heterogeneity on social capital as well as possible moderating factors.

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*Astrid Körner*

I studied Psychology at the Friedrich Schiller University of Jena and received my Diploma in Fall 2008. During my studies, I worked as a research assistant in the research project "Individual and Social Resources for Coping with Social Change: Development and Psychosocial Effects" (Project C6; Collaborative Research Center (CRC) 580; PI: R. K. Silbereisen). There, I have developed a strong interest in the impact of social and economic changes on individuals' psychosocial adjustment and development. In my diploma thesis I investigated whether different types of strategies to deal with demands emerging from such macro-contextual changes in the field of work (e.g., rising difficulties to plan one's career path) moderate the negative relationship between (long- and short-term) unemployment and psychological well-being.

As a GSBC doctoral fellow, I will further explore individual development in times of social and economic change with a special focus on the role of personal, social, and socio-structural resources for dealing with changes. Specifically, with my PhD project I plan to examine how individuals' resources change over time and how (patterns of) resource losses and gains might influence individuals' psychosocial adjustment. For this purpose, I will analyze longitudinal data from three waves from the Jena Study on Social Change and Human Development which is conducted by my main advisor Prof. Dr. Rainer K. Silbereisen (Department of Developmental Psychology and Center for Applied Developmental Science) and his research team within the CRC 580.

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*Leonhard Lades*

My name is Leonhard Lades and I am working as a Ph.D. student at the Jena Graduate School "Human Behaviour in Social and Economic Change" (GSBC) since February 2009. I studied economics in Bielefeld and Bonn with emphasis on macroeconomic theory and received my degree (Dipl. Volkswirt) from the University of Bonn in 2008. In my diploma thesis I described a way to model both, business cycles and growth endogenously with the idea of Schumpeter's creative destruction.

Now my research interest has switched to the demand side and I am interested in the motivational foundations of consumer behaviour. I want to use psychological insights to explain changed consumer behaviour in connection with the difference between liking and wanting.

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*Andrea Michel*

My name is Andrea Michel. I studied Psychology (Diploma) at the Friedrich-Schiller-University of Jena and Human Development and Family Studies at the Pennsylvania State University (USA). During my graduate studies I became interested in acculturation and adaptational processes of immigrants, in adolescent development, cross-cultural comparisons and longitudinal research approaches. My diploma thesis, which I completed in December 2007, was on second language acquisition of adolescent ethnic German immigrants from the former Soviet Union. Data for this research were provided by a project on the impact of societal and cultural adaptation of juvenile immigrants from the former Soviet Union in Israel and Germany on delinquency and deviant behavior, funded by the German-Israeli Project Coordination (DIP; PIs Germany: Prof. Dr. Rainer K. Silbereisen, PD Dr. Eva Schmitt-Rodermund).

Since 2008, I have worked as a research associate in an international research project on the regulation of developmental transitions in second generation immigrants in Germany and Israel at the Department of Developmental Psychology and Center for Applied Developmental Science in Jena. In my PhD-thesis I will examine the effects of social support and perceived discrimination on psychological adaptation of adolescent immigrants in Germany and Israel, using a comparative and longitudinal approach. I am very happy to be able to continue my research on adolescent immigrants by receiving a fellowship from the GSBC.

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*Maja Schachner*

My name is Maja Schachner and I will be a PhD student at the GSBC from April 2009. I have obtained my BA in Psychology with Contemporary European Studies from the University of Sussex in 2006, have then worked as an Equal Opportunities & Diversity Advisor for the British Council in London and graduated with an MSc in Cross-Cultural Psychology from Brunel University West London in 2009.

Academically and professionally, my interests so far have been in intergroup (and intercultural) relations, prejudice and how to prevent or overcome it. Academically, as part of my BA thesis I have examined the impact of terror management mechanisms on people's political attitudes after the terrorist attacks in London in 2005, whereas my MSc thesis was concerned with the relationship between ingroup inclusiveness in multiple social identities, cultural measures of inclusiveness and tolerance in a cross-cultural comparison of Poland and the former East and West parts of Germany.

In my PhD project, I would like to continue along those lines, exploring, amongst other aspects, the role of universal values in forming a more inclusive and prejudice-free environment at work and possibilities of using the work context as a means of supporting the integration and acculturation of immigrants into the wider society.

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*Robert Weigelt*

I am a PhD student at the Jena Graduate School "Human Behaviour in Social and Economic Change" since January 2009. I studied economics at the Friedrich Schiller University of Jena and the Karl Franzens University of Graz. After my diploma thesis about "Cost development and technical progress in health care", I received my degree ("Dipl. Volkswirt") from the University of Jena in 2008.

Within the GSBC, I intend to put emphasis on the findings and ideas from my diploma thesis. In detail, I attempt examining the role of physicians with respect to the adoption and promotion of medical innovations. The main reason for the focus is that physicians as gatekeepers to the health care system play a crucial role in the innovation process. Their preferences and rules which they are subject to, determine the degree to both acceptance and diffusion of new technologies. Therefore, the aim of the research project is to shed light on the existing interrelations between medical innovations and the behaviour of physicians by using economic considerations and psychological insights.

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## **NEW GRADUATE COLLEGE „FOUNDATIONS OF GLOBAL FINANCIAL MARKETS - STABILITY AND CHANGE” (GFINM)**

The post-graduate programme Global Financial Markets – Stability and Change is a joint project of the Friedrich-Schiller-University Jena (Prof. Christoph Ohler, L.L.M) and the Martin-Luther-University Halle-Wittenberg (Prof. Dr. Christian Tietje, LL.M.).



The post-graduate programme focuses on the fundamental principles of globalized financial markets. With the stability of the financial system as its main focus, the programme is dedicated to interdisciplinary research from a legal and economic perspective. With the financial crisis still raging through the markets, the aim of the programme is a scientific discourse of how international financial markets and their supervision should work in the future.

The programme is funded by the foundation "Geld und Wahrung" for five years. It offers 20 doctoral fellowships for young economists and lawyers. Starting in April, the first three graduates will take up their research in Jena. The programme is supported by 10 advising Professors from Jena, Halle, Leipzig and Erfurt.

### *GK-EIC - IMPRS Summer School 2009 (IMPreSS 2009)*

The third IMPRS - Uncertainty Summer School (IMPreSS 2009) is scheduled from July 26th, until August 21th, 2008 at the Max Planck Institute of Economics, Jena (<http://www.econ.mpg.de>). From July 26th until August 8th 2009, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Jena Summer Academy on "Innovation and Uncertainty" will be jointly hosted by the DFG Research Training Group "The Economics of Innovative Change" (GK-EIC) and the International Max Planck Research School on Adapting Behavior in a Fundamentally Uncertain World (IMPRS). The focus of this year's edition will again lie on foundations of (innovative) behavior, entrepreneurship, the generation of innovations and their diffusion, the change of regional and sectoral structures caused by innovations, the role of the demand side in this context, as well as the political management of change.

Just like in the last two years, the IMPRS Summer School will continue in the second and the third week of August to cover a number of specific topics related to how subjects behave under fundamental uncertainty. The IMPRS Uncertainty Summer School aims at stimulating the scientific discourse on decision making under uncertainty between economists, psychologists and legal scholars.
