LATEST NEWS

New BMBF project for Stefanie Hiß

Stefanie Hiß has received funding from the Bundesministerium für Bildung und Forschung (BMBF) as part of the funding initiative "Financial System and Society" for the research project "Double Dividend? The Contribution of Sustainable Investments to the Stabilization of Financial Markets". The project investigates the (potential) contribution of sustainable investments (SI) to the stabilization of financial markets, whereby SI occurs as an alternative to the prevailing institutional logics of financial markets: profit maximization and short-term nature. The aim of the project – based on international comparison and the cooperation with practitioners – is to identify components of a sustainable logic which induce the 'Double Dividend' of sustainable investing: next to return on investments and the sustainable impact on corporations the project focuses on the positive impact of sustainable investing on the financial market itself and its stability. The project is scheduled for three years.



Jean Monnet Project Conference

In its project conference (May 7th – 9th, 2015), the Jean Monnet Centre of Excellence Jena addresses the issue of "European Economy and People's Mobility" from an interdisciplinary perspective. In economic terms, "factor mobility" is an important tool for achieving economic wealth, particularly with respect to the common currency within the Economic and Monetary Union. More than other economic trans-border processes, the mobility of individuals has important repercussions upon social and social-psychological situa-

tions within the Member States. From all legal issues involved, the development of labour law is of utmost importance, given the conflict between fundamental freedoms and the fundamental right to strike, the tension between freedom of services and the extension of the host country's working conditions to the employment relationships of posted workers as well as the impact of the ECJ's recent case law on the freedom establishing systems of board-level participation (such as the German "Mitbestimmung").

DFG funding for Silke Uebelmesser



Silke Uebelmesser received funding from the German Research Foundation (DFG) for a project on the topic of "Language Learning of Migration". The entire duration of the funding is two years.

This project wants to examine the motives of language learning in relation to migration and integration, focusing on the case of Germany. We will construct a panel dataset from the records of the German Goethe Institute, which is an important provider of German language courses abroad and in Germany.

The research group of Peter Noack has received funding from the EU Horizon 2020 program for the research project "European Citizenship". The project will be conducted as part of the "CATCH-EyoU-consortium" which is coordinated by Elvira Cicognani at the University of Bologna.



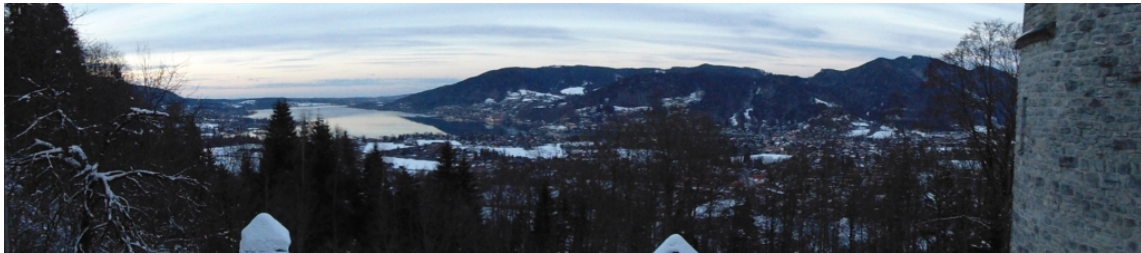
Habilitation by Maria K. Pavlova completed

Conference presentations by the GSBC fellows**Severin Weingarten on “Language Learning and Migration: Results from A New Dataset on Language Course Participation”**

Presentation at the CGDE Doctoral Workshop, Halle, Germany (March 10, 2015), CESifo Arbeitsmarktworkshop, Dresden, Germany (March 19-20, 2015), and 71st Annual Congress of the International Institute of Public Finance (IIPF), Dublin, Ireland (August 20-23, 2015).

Optimal integration policies should take the language skills of arriving migrants into account. However, little is known about the determinants of these skills, because most survey-based studies cannot distinguish between language learning before and after migration. We present a new dataset which reports the extent of language course and exam participation at the German Goethe institutes in 91 countries for the period 1966–2013. The dataset allows for a detailed examination of the determinants and consequences of adult language learning on the institute and country level. We estimate a fixed-effects model for the relationship between language learning and a set of macro-economic variables. Immigration flows are positively correlated with exam participation. Additionally, in EU countries, migrant stocks are positively correlated with course and exam participation. They may act as a proxy for otherwise unobserved short-term migration and cultural ties, both of which could influence language learning decisions. In non-EU countries, the link between migration and language learning is strengthened by two factors: By positive economic conditions, indicating that migrants who leave amidst economic turmoil may arrive with worse language skills. And by linguistic distance, indicating that migrants react to distance by increasing learning effort instead of refraining from learning the language.

Michael Wyrwich on “The persistence of spatial differences in labor force participation of women”

Presentation at the Annual Meeting of the Economic History Society, Telford, UK (March 29, 2015).

Female labor force participation (FLFP) increased significantly over the course of the 20th century while at the same time there are persistent spatial differences. This paper addresses both issues and investigates how historical spatial differences in the degree of industrialization relate to FLFP and its persistence. Against this background, this paper investigates the impact of the second industrial revolution on the increase of FLFP, the role of regional differences in the degree of industrialization in the early 20th century on spatial differences of FLFP, and the lasting impact on spatial differences in female labor supply and social acceptance of working women in the 21st century. The results show that industrialization had a positive effect on FLFP in the early 20th century. To rule out endogeneity, the historical degree of industrialization is instrumented by the population share of Protestants. Historical Industrialization also affects regional differences in FLFP today whereas current industry structure does not. This indicates that a positive attitude toward working women rather than a persistence of industry structures drives long-term persistence in spatial differences in FLFP. This is corroborated by survey evidence show-

ing that both women and men are more open toward accepting working women in regions with a historical high FLFP while current FLFP is not at all related to this pattern. Additionally it turns out that regions with a historical mark up in working women in "socially respected" clerical (office) jobs that are due to the rise of industrialization have a higher share of women in management positions today while there is no relationship with the share of women in office jobs today.

Maria K. Pavlova on "Family, Friends, and Community: Their Significance for Civic Participation Across the Life Span" (with Astrid Körner and Rainer K. Silbereisen)

Presentation at the "Family, Friends, and Community: Their Significance for Civic Participation Across the Life Span" at the XVII European Conference on Developmental Psychology, Braga, Portugal (September 2015).

Background. Are social contexts as important to civic participation in adulthood as they are in adolescence? In the present study, we investigated the relationships of supportive family and friends and positive community functioning with civic participation in adulthood. Drawing on convoy theory and socioemotional selectivity theory, we expected to find certain age differences in these associations.

Method. We used data from a cross-sectional sample of German adults aged 18-75 who were surveyed in 2013 by mail. The sample was split into four age groups: 18-29 (N1 = 442), 30-44 (N2 = 596), 45-59 (N3 = 1,095), and 60-75 (N4 = 931). We measured general (i.e., not specific to civic participation) support from family and friends, perceived social cohesion in the community, place attachment, and organizational collective efficacy (i.e., a belief that local voluntary organizations can achieve their ends). Indicators of civic participation were intensity (i.e., frequency in the last 12 months), breadth (i.e., the number of domains), and future intentions in those currently not engaged.

Results. We found that perceived support from family was negatively associated with the breadth of civic participation in the youngest group and with future intentions for civic participation in three age groups. Perceived support from friends had positive relationships with the intensity of civic participation and with future intentions at ages 30-44. Place attachment and organizational collective efficacy were positively related to all indicators of civic participation, and some of these associations held across age groups. In contrast, social cohesion had no significant effects.

Discussion. Our findings indicate that some social contextual factors (e.g., family support or organizational collective efficacy) may hamper or promote civic participation across adulthood, whereas others (e.g., support from friends) appear to be more age specific.
