LATEST NEWS

New GSBC-Faculty-Member: Prof Franz J. Neyer (Chair of Differential Psychology and Personality Psychology)

With the beginning of the summer term 2009 Franz Neyer has transferred from the University of Potsdam to the Friedrich Schiller University of Jena. Now he holds the chair of Differential Psychology and Personality Psychology (former: Rainer Riemann).



According to his research interest Franz Neyer writes in his CV: *"My research focuses on personality and social relationships. In particular, I am interested in the dynamic transaction between adult personality development and the regulation of social relationships. One basic assumption is that normative investment in social relationships is a major moderator of personality change, whereas personality stability is mainly achieved through continuous interaction patterns in ongoing relationships. More recently, the processes of closeness regulation and reciprocity monitoring in relationships are investigated in order to more deeply understand the proximal mechanisms of personality development. A new research venue is the adaptive use of new technologies in old age. My work is based on longitudinal, dyadic, and multi-informant designs that are (mostly) realized in field studies. My research has been funded by several DFG grants."*

The faculty of the GSBC decided to welcome Franz Neyer as new faculty member.

Grants and Offers

As president of the International Union of Psychological Science (IUPsyS) Rainer K. Silbereisen received funding from the Jacobs Foundation (Zürich) to support the collaboration with young scientists from developing countries.

Claudia M. Haase declined an offer for an Assistant Professor position at the Department of Psychology at the University of Alberta, Canada.

Claudia M. Haase has received funding from the German Research Foundation (DFG) for a two-year research fellowship to work with Robert W. Levenson at the Institute of Personality and Social Research at the University of California, Berkeley.

Within the European research funding scheme DIME, a joint proposal by Friedrich Schiller University Jena and Bocconi University (Milan) has been awarded resources for the project **User-Producer Networks, Technological Trajectories, and the Dynamics of Industries** (Coordinator: Uwe Cantner, FSU participants: Marco Guerzoni (Chair of Microeconomics), Arianna Martinelli and Tatiana Plotnikova (both EIC)). The aim of the project is to investigate from a new perspective the subject of industrial dynamics. Specifically, our purpose is to explain the dynamics within a sector by looking at both the co-evolution of demand and technology and the resulting impact of firms' performance. As methodology we will make use of directed network to highlight the flow of knowledge between users and producers.

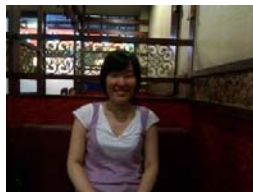
dent migration by examining the impact of personality factors on the development of student migrants' social networks in a longitudinal design.

EIC – New Fellows

Arianna Martinelli

My name is Arianna Martinelli and I started working at the GSBC in February 2009. I hold a degree in Economics and Social Studies from Bocconi University in Milan and a M.Sc a Master Degree in Industry and Innovation Analysis from SPRU (Science and Technology Policy Research, Sussex University, United Kingdom). In the last four years I have been working on my PhD at ECIS (Eindhoven Centre for Innovation Studies, Eindhoven University of Technology, The Netherlands).

My research interests are rather broad as they focus on the relation between technological change and industrial dynamics (in telecommunication manufacturing). Furthermore, I am interested in technological indicators, in particular any use (and mis-use) of patents data. My PhD thesis deals with the long-term structural evolution of the telecommunication switching industry, analyzing both the technology and the firm level, including both qualitative and quantitative analysis. The first contribution is methodological, through the development of an empirical method for detecting technological ruptures in a patent citation network. The second contribution is in the tradition of evolutionary economics, by providing an in depth industry case study (complemented with econometric analysis), enriching the bulk of appreciative theorizing about the relation between technology and industry evolution in an oligopolistic and regulated sector.

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Bastian Rake



My name is Bastian Rake and since May 2009 I am a PhD student at the graduate college "The Economics of Innovative Change". I studied Business Administration (diploma) at the Friedrich Schiller University of Jena and the University Rey Juan Carlos of Madrid with emphasis in economics of innovation, marketing, and accounting/controlling. In my diploma thesis "Remuneration and Technological Progress in Health Care" I illustrated physicians'/ providers' technology adoption incentives with respect to different payment systems. I gained further experience in academic working during an internship at the Centre for European Economic Research (ZEW) in Mannheim and as a student assistant at the chair of microeconomics (Prof. Dr. Uwe Cantner, project "Innoheart").

In my PhD project I would like to develop some ideas of my diploma thesis in greater detail, in order to achieve further insights concerning technology adoption decisions in the health care sector. Understanding this process seems to be important with respect to cost development, medical outcome and ethical perspectives.

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Alexander Schacht

I am a PhD student at the Jena Graduate School "The Economics of Innovative Change" since May 2009. I studied economics at the Friedrich Schiller University of Jena and at the University of Aberdeen, Scotland. I wrote my diploma thesis at the Max Planck Institute of Economics in Jena at the Evolutionary Economics Group about "Licensing inventions of public research - a geographical analysis for the Max Planck Society". In my diploma thesis I have examined if the probability of licensing patents of the Max Planck Society as well as commercial success depends on geographic distance. I received my degree as an economist (Dipl. Volkswirt) from the Friedrich Schiller University of Jena in May 2009.

My research interest is not only focused on Technology Transfer from Public to Private. I am also interested in Entrepreneurship and Industrial Dynamics. Within the EIC I have the opportunity to go on to make research along my fields of interest.

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Sebastian Vergara

Since April 2009, I am a PhD student at the Economics of Innovative Change Program. I am also a staff member (on leave) in the United Nations Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC). In ECLAC I worked for several years in the topics of foreign direct investment and international competitiveness in one hand, and small and medium size enterprises (SMEs) and firm demographics in the other. With respect to my education, I obtain my Bachelor degree in Universidad de Chile (1999), and then I pursued a Master of Arts in International Economics at University of Sussex, United Kingdom (2007).



Now I would like to focus my PhD research activities on the issues of firm demographics, product switching, international trade and innovation. In particular, I would like to focus my analysis in the understanding of the processes of entry, exit and survival of firms in one hand, and the product choice decisions in the other, in a context of trade liberalization. The theoretical framework of the

PhD thesis will draw on contributions concerning the industrial organization, international trade and innovation literature in a context of heterogeneous firms and products.

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6TH IGC SUMMER SCHOOL

„Conflict and Cooperation in Intergroup Relations“ (April 3-9, 2009, Schloss Hasenwinkel)

The Summer School is part of the IGC's study programme and intends to cover the broader perspective of the IGC-research programme, providing participants with a solid orientation concerning the general topic as a whole and the position of their respective dissertation projects in particular. It is to note that the IGC summer school is not only open to fellows of the IGC. Doctoral students from external Universities and institutions have the opportunity to apply for as well. Therefore, the participants of this year's summer school, the sixth and last of the IGC "Conflict and Cooperation between Social Groups", came from all over the world, representing more than 15 different countries.

Core of the study programme were four parallel workshops which were supervised by highly experienced invited tutors who are top-ranking experts within the theme of each workshop. Each of them was supported by a co-teacher from within the IGC faculty.

- John Dovidio (Yale University, USA), & Rupert Brown (University of Sussex, UK): Social Categorization and Intergroup Bias: Beyond Attitudes to Action.
- John Duckitt (University of Auckland, New Zealand), & Roger Giner-Sorolla (University of Kent at Canterbury, UK): Social Psychological Processes in Reconciliation and the Need Based Model of Reconciliation.
- John Jost (New York University, USA), & Christopher Cohrs (Queen's University Belfast, UK): Political Ideology
- Arie Nadler (Tel Aviv University, Israel), & Amélie Mummendey (University of Jena, Germany): Social Psychological Processes in Reconciliation and the Need Based Model of Reconciliation.

Each workgroup comprised 10 doctoral students. After a general introduction of the workshop topic by the teachers, participants discussed about open questions and gaps within this field of research. Then, the groups split up into smaller groups, and developed empirical studies that would address key theoretical questions with regard to the workshop topic. These ideas have been presented to the entire group on the final day. Given that the school took place for only one week, it is usually not possible for students to conduct studies during the Summer School. Therefore, the participants planned the studies in such a way that it would be possible to conduct them at one or more of the participants' home universities. And meanwhile we learned that several international studies have been initiated.

Additionally, daily lectures of the invited teachers as well as lively discussions and the well received opportunities for individual consultation meetings of the doctoral students with the senior experts were part of the programme.

The Summer School took place at Hasenwinkel Castle (near Schwerin, Germany). The beautiful and spacious building and the palace gardens provided the ideal environment for meetings of the small work groups.
