### *Grants and Offers*

*Nobel Prize for IMPRS Uncertainty faculty member Elinor Ostrom*

The 2009 Nobel Prize in Economic Sciences was awarded to Elinor Ostrom (together with Oliver E. Williamson), a distinguished IMPRS Uncertainty faculty member! She gained the Nobel Prize for "her analysis of economic governance, especially the commons". She is the first woman that won the Nobel Prize in this category.

Elinor Ostrom is professor at the IMPRS Uncertainties' partner institution Indiana University, Bloomington (USA), where she is working in the field of political science and environmental economics. Students of the IMPRS Uncertainty profit greatly from her expertise and advice. For example, 13 of the IMPRS Uncertainty students elaborated and discussed their projects with her at last years' Topics Workshop in Bloomington.

## **IMPRS: REPORT TOPICS WORKSHOP TRENTO, SEPTEMBER 21<sup>ST</sup> – 25<sup>TH</sup>, 2009**



### *Monday, September 21<sup>st</sup>*

Since most students arrived Monday, our workshop started with a warm welcome at the Chamber of Commerce in Trento. Serving excellent zips of wine and cheese, the official Welcome Aperitif was very much appreciated.

### *Tuesday, September 22<sup>nd</sup>*

As early as 9.00 am the Director of the PhD Program in Economics and Management gave her welcome and introduction. Right after the brief introduction, Christopher L. Gilbert talked on "Excessive Speculation?"

Subsequently, Kumaraswamy Vela Velupillai presented his thoughts on "The Algorithmic Revolution in the Social Sciences- Mathematical Economics, Game Theory, and Statistical Inference". He ingeniously combined anecdotes from economic and psychological science history to point out his arguments.

Matteo Ploner talked on "Determinants of In-group Bias: Is Group Affiliation Mediated by Guilt-Aversion?" His work is closely related to the MPI in Jena, since Matteo is a frequently visiting scientist at the Strategic Interaction Group.

After this, Luciano Andreozzi gave insights into his work on "You would do the same for me: Counterfactual reciprocity in games", the new doctoral students starting at the Doctoral Programme in Economics and Management were introduced and welcomed to the scientific community.



**Wednesday, September 23<sup>rd</sup>**

In the morning of our second day in Trento Oksana Tokarchuk gave insights into "Framing effects in Multiple Price List Choice task Elicitation Method". Soon after, the talk "Net Reward Attractions Equilibrium for Strategic Form Games and its Experimental Test" was given by Davide Marchiori.

Especially the discussion with Andrea Fracasso about "The Evolution of the Sino-American Co-Dependency: Modelling a Regime Switch in a Growth Setting" showed economic insights besides the standard experimental program.

The managing director of the IMPRS Uncertainty program Werner Güth joined our Topics Workshop and took the opportunity to present his work on the indirect evolution in economic processes by presenting "Pull, Push, or both? Indirect Evolution in Economics and Beyond"

As a welcomed alternation in the program, the organizers of the Trento Topics Work-shop planed a guided tour through the city and a visit to the Castello del Buonconsiglio.

Getting to know a big part of the ancient history turned out to be quite a hard task. The cities' history reaches back to roman times and is full of events and interesting anecdotes. E.g., Trento became famous by hosting the Council of Trent (1545-1563), giving strength to the Counter-Reformation.



**Thursday, September 24<sup>th</sup>**

The last day of our workshop was opened by Sara Depedri. Her psychologically founded paper "A Behavioral Approach to Non-Profit Organizations: Job satisfaction and Employees' Motivation" add to our interdisciplinary approach.

Subsequently, Lucia Savadori presented "Time and Relative Importance of Probabilities and Payoffs in Choices", returning to economic shores.

Similarly, Giuseppe Vittucci who talked on "R&D Spillovers and Technology Diffusion in Networks" was touching the field of economics, e.g., economics of innovation.

Completing the cycle of the IMPRS Uncertainty disciplines - economics, psychology, and law - Giuseppe Bellantuono spoke about "Contract Law, Regulation, and Institutional Design".

The academic schedule was concluded by a joint poster session of IMPRS students and students of the Doctoral School of the Interdepartmental Centre for Research Training in Economics and Management (CIFREM).

## **ANNOUNCEMENTS**

**4th FLOSS International Workshop on Free/Libre Open Source Software**

The GSBC and Department of Economics at the Friedrich Schiller University Jena will host the 4th FLOSS International Workshop on Free/Libre Open Source Software, on the topic of "Business models, social networks and collaborative knowledge development", on **July 1-2, 2010**.

This fourth FLOSS workshop continues along with the tradition of the first three meetings (Nice Sophia Antipolis - 2007, Rennes - 2008, Padua - 2009). We propose to discuss the many debated issues related to Free/Libre Open Source Systems.

The fourth FLOSS workshop will focus on research with respect to open source business models, social networks, and innovation. Thus, this year we would like to encourage contributions that relate open source business models and the role of firms in the OSS community, the organization of OS development communities and the dynamics of the links between their actors, as well as their capacity to innovate.

FLOSS embraces many dimensions and it is of interest for very different disciplines. We therefore welcome submissions from various fields: economics & management, sociology, law, information systems & computer science, etc... We will consider both empirical approaches (surveys and case studies, econometric or experimental methods) and theoretical approaches (modelling, simulations).

Papers may focus more particularly on the following (non exhaustive) list of issues:

- 1) Knowledge flows and network structure: Analysis of open source social networks and their joining scripts, functioning of open source development platforms, network structural approaches to roles in OS organizations.
- 2) Governance mechanism and incentive structures: Social and technical structures, coordination and division of labour, leadership and conflict resolution.
- 3) The role of licenses and of licensing strategies: Licenses and incentives for innovators, license proliferation and incompatibilities, mixed licensing, reforms in Intellectual Property Right.
- 4) Different innovation models: Open innovation, user innovation, public domain innovation. Project coordination, standards and interoperability.
- 5) Commercialization of OSS: Role of commercial players (e.g. firms) in the open source community, sustainability of commercial OS strategies and OSS business models, degree of openness of firm owned OS projects.
- 6) Hybridization and Interactions between open and closed source: Competition between open and closed source software, mixed strategies of firms (hybridization), as well as co-existence and complementary of open and closed approaches.
- 7) Open Source beyond software: Analogies with social networking, blogging and collaborative knowledge development, applicability of the open source model beyond software code (e.g. open source biology).
- 8) Taking stock of the field: How to combine different approaches to the understanding of open source development (experiments, simulations, case studies, empirics, theoretical modelling).

The keynote speaker of this third workshop will be Jürgen Bitzer (Carl von Ossietzky Universität Oldenburg) who will present his research on "Returns to Open Source Software Engagement: An Empirical Test of the Signalling Hypothesis". There will also be a thematic presentation by: Rebeca Méndez-Durón (Universitat de les Illes Balears) on "Returns from Social Capital in Open Source Software Networks".

The organizers of the workshop are Alexia Gaudeul (GSBC), Sebastian von Engelhardt (FSU Jena) and Kristina von Rhein (GSBC). Monika Adler (FSU Jena) will take care of the administration of the workshop.

The USA's legal tradition has prioritized the principles of autonomy and liberty, and it has protected and advanced the rights of Americans for over 200 years. But the German legal principle of Würde has something to offer the US, per example. The original writing and the actual structure of the German constitution are directly relevant, but we also focus upon the experience of jurisprudence in Germany's past sixty years as a source of insight into the persisting value of the legal and moral principle. Key here is the way that law is potentially a source of moral development. Participants come mainly from the fields of law and philosophy.
