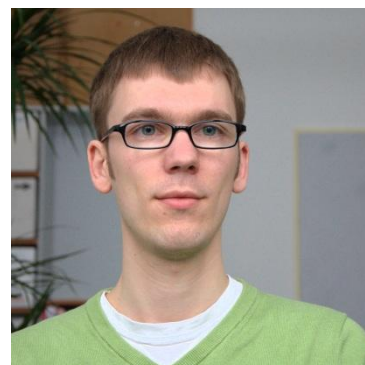
Some of the PhD students might know me because during my studies I was a research assistant at the GSBC-EIC and at the interdisciplinary research project "Thuringian Founder Study".

***New Project******Franz J. Neyer and Peter Noack received a research grant from the Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft: "Personality, Identity and Relationships Development of Adolescent Sojourners"***

Residential mobility (i.e., moves that either are permanent or temporary, deliberate or forced) has become one of the major challenges to individual life management in the 21st century. For example, international student exchanges are highly valued already among adolescents. Using a prospective control group design (with integrated diary study), this project sets out to study the consequences of staying abroad (for about 1 year) for the development of personality, identity and social relationships in adolescence. It will be investigated, which personality and identity characteristics predispose adolescents for moving abroad (selection effects), which are the consequences that sojourning has on subsequent individual development (socialization effects), and which mediating role play social relationships (family vs. peers, home vs. host, offline vs. online, strong vs. weak ties) (mediation effects). Furthermore, the dynamic interplay between personality and identity development in the sojourning context will be examined (transaction effects). This project adds to the understanding of general personality development in adolescence and sheds light on a social phenomenon that becomes increasingly relevant at all stages of the human life course.



**Special Issue**

***Interdisciplinary Special Issue on Developmental Science of Entrepreneurship***

The Special Issue "Entrepreneurship from a Developmental Science Perspective", edited by Martin Obschonka and Rainer K. Silbereisen, has appeared in the December 2012 issue of the International Journal of Developmental Science. The Special Issue puts the focus on a person's entrepreneurial development and brings together internationally renowned experts from different fields such as economics (e.g., Scott Shane, Case Western Reserve University; Michael Fritsch, University of Jena), developmental psychology (e.g., William Damon, Stanford University; Richard Lerner, Tufts University), educational psychology (e.g., Ingrid Schoon, University of London), occupational psychology (e.g., Michael Frese, National University of Singapore), and sociology (e.g., Barbara Schneider, Michigan State University).

The Special Issue applies a modern understanding of developmental science to the field of entrepreneurship. Entrepreneurial development is understood as a lifelong process characterized by the orchestration of gains and losses, and as a complex system involving biological, psychosocial, behavioral, and contextual factors that interact. Topics covered in the Special Issue range from genetic effects, early precursors in childhood and adolescence, youth entrepreneurship, school motivation of budding entrepreneurs, entrepreneurial career patterns, and the role of the macro-context in entrepreneurial development. Results were mainly derived from long-term longitudinal surveys from various countries. For example, the article by Martin Obschonka, Kathryn Duckworth, Rainer K. Silbereisen, and Ingrid Schoon analyzes data from the British Cohort Study and the German Thuringian Founder Study to explore the role of early social competencies in childhood and adolescence as predictors of entrepreneurial behavior and success in young adulthood. The research findings presented in the Special Issue have implications for theory development in entrepreneurship and the world of practice, particularly for entrepreneurship education.

### ***Elena Semenova (GSBC) is the co-chair of the panel "Federalism in Authoritarian Regimes: The Case of Russia" at the 7th General Conference of the European Consortium for Political Research (France, September 2013)***

Abstract: Over the first 20 years after the demise of Communism, Russia has transformed from a limited democracy to a consolidated authoritarian regime. The panel deals with the interdependence of transformation and federalism in Russia as well as with its functioning under the conditions of "new" authoritarianism. This topic is highly relevant considering that the Russian Federation is, by its constitutional structure, one of the larg-



est multi-ethnic federations in the world. The Russian regions differ substantially with regard to their legal status, socio-economic performance, and ethnic composition.

Since 2000, the Russian federalism significantly changed its nature, transforming from a "spontaneously decentralised" to an increasingly recentralised federal state. The powers of the regions and their governors were dramatically weakened. At the same time, informal institutions and networks sustainably forming federal relations gained strength. Any hopes that Medvedev, as the President of Russia, would reverse Putin's "vertical of power" were shattered. With respect to recent reforms, it is debatable whether they point to a careful liberalisation or not.

The panel addresses the development of federalism in an authoritarian regime, using Russia as an example. It invites papers with a focus on the following topics:

- 1) Theoretical analysis: Does the Russian experience fit with existing assumptions about the relationship between democracy, authoritarianism, and federalism? Does it require new or more specific theoretical approaches?
- 2) Governance: Are federal autocracies developing unique mechanisms of governance? How does the party system frame federal relations?
- 3) Networks: How are networks shaping centre-regional relationships? What is the role of elite networks? Do powerful networks weaken federalism or do they offer access for the regions to regain power?
- 4) Policies: What kind of policy-related variations can be observed in central-regional relations?

Papers with a strong empirical basis are particularly welcome.

***Elena Semenova (GSBC) is the chair of the panel "Advanced Research Methods for Elite Studies" at the 7th General Conference of the European Consortium for Political Research (France, September 2013)***

Abstract: This panel deals with the methodological aspects of elite studies (see Moyser and Wagstaffe 1987). Depending on the particular field (see Hoffmann-Lange 2007), scholars have used different methods of data collection and analysis.

Some quantitative (e.g., OLS and multinomial regression as well as factor and correspondence analysis) and qualitative methods (e.g., narrative interviews, focus groups, and text analysis) have been widely applied in elite studies. Researchers have also recently started to use more advanced methods such as survival analysis, multi-level modelling, network analysis, qualitative comparative analysis (QCA), and sequence analysis.

We would like to invite empirical papers that focus primarily on elites and that use advanced data analysis methods. Papers should illustrate the benefits of the chosen method for elite research. Possible topics may include elite recruitment, turnover, career patterns, elite structure, and elite-mass distinction.

Papers analysing longitudinal data are particularly welcome.

**Conference presentations by the GSBC fellows**

***Lars Vogel on "The Impact of Recruitment on Political Performance: Regional Ministers in Germany since 1990"***

SSHRC Workshop on „Selection and De-Selection of Political Elites in Subnational Systems“ at Concordia University, Montreal, Canada, October 2012

A guiding assumption in the study of the recruitment patterns of political elites is that they tell us something about the post-recruitment political career of these new elite members. On the contrary another assumption is that elite positions change the resources, the scope of action and ultimately the behavior of their occupants, which may hamper predictions about their future career based on recruitment patterns. This paper therefore tests, if the differences in recruitment patterns of ministers in Germany impact their duration in office, which is considered an indication of political performance. Of particular interest is the impact of different patterns of political careers: inside and outside parliament, experience in party and public positions and the relation between expert knowledge and political experience. The results show that recruitment matters for ministerial performance whereby not all political positions are influential. Moreover, some positions which are of particular importance for ministerial recruitment appear as disadvantageous while other positions of marginal importance, like public mandates at local level, even unfold beneficial influence. The data basis is provided by two longitudinal datasets covering the (political) biographies of German regional ministers and parliamentarians on duty between 1990 and 2011.

***Katharina Eckartz on "The effect of financial incentives on performance in different real effort tasks"***

SEEK Workshop on Incentives and Innovations, ZEW Mannheim, Germany, November 2012

We examine performance in real-effort tasks under three different financial incentive-schemes in the lab. More specifically, we compare performance in a word based creativity task, performance in a cognitive task (adding numbers) and in a pure effort task (counting 0s and 1s) under three incentive schemes: a flat fee, a linear payment and a tournament. We find that, independent of the task we look at, no effects of different incentive schemes on subjects' performance. When introducing an outside option, a paid pause, subjects' performance under a flat payment drops; it is still significantly higher than ze-



ro, however. This effect is observable in all examined tasks, however, the size of the effect differs.

***Fernando Campos Medina on "Socio-ecological conflicts as challenge for sustainability, Mining industry in the Atacama Desert narratives and images of a crisis"***

International Graduate Conference: Latin-American perspectives after Rio+20. Hamburg University, Germany, November 2012

-----

The presentation is based on a research trip to the Atacama Desert (North of Chile) in 2012, with the intention to explore different narratives of the environmental conflict between the big mining industry and the local community. In this sense, the conceptualization of "narratives" offers the possibility to better understand the ambivalent role played by the different social actors in this socio-ecological conflicts, where the main conclusion shows how the growing of the mining industry is no longer only a productive or economic restructuring but the recreation of new forms of life in the whole region.
